

THE ECONOMIC IMPACT OF MICHIGAN'S NONPROFIT SECTOR

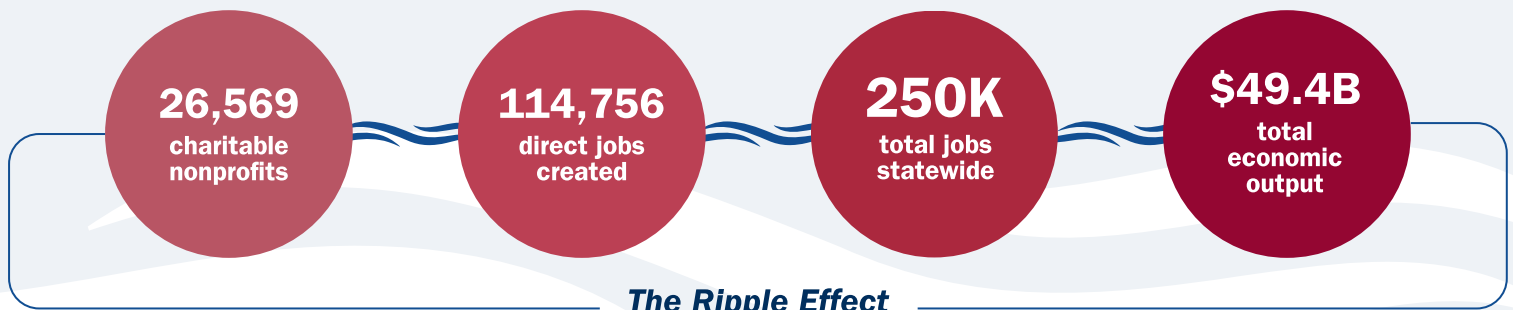
Nonprofits employ 469,003 people, or 10% of the state's workforce. Including indirect and induced employment supported by purchases from businesses by nonprofits and their employees, the sector is responsible for roughly one in five jobs in Michigan. Michigan nonprofits generate \$34.2 billion in wages — money that flows directly into households, local businesses and communities across the state.



Michigan's Charitable Nonprofits: By the Numbers

Nonprofits are critical service providers and employers in rural, suburban and urban communities across the state, providing jobs, buying from local vendors and keeping money circulating in our neighborhoods.

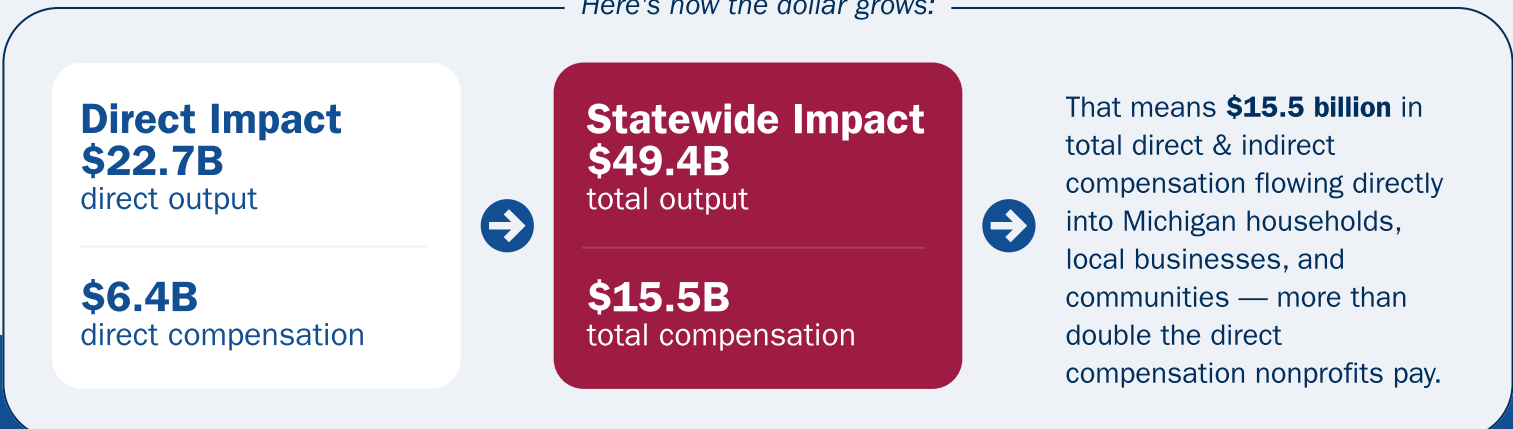
From Community Action to Statewide Impact

When a nonprofit spends a dollar, it doesn't stop at the first transaction — it grows as it moves through the economy.

Every \$1 spent by charitable nonprofits generates another \$1.10 in the economy.

Creating Opportunity

Nonprofits employ **10% of Michigan workers** and support **20% of all workers** across Michigan's economy.

Top Sectors by Employment

Catalyst for Job Growth

These 114,756 nonprofit employees support 252,370 jobs statewide.

For every 10 nonprofit jobs, 12 more are created or supported in other industries.

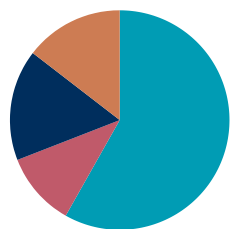

\$41.0B Direct compensation → **\$68.6B** Total compensation

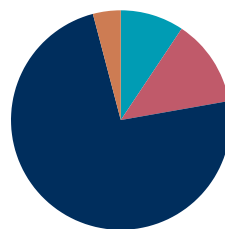
Direct Wages for Nonprofit Employees
